

Diamante

Designed by Sarah Wilson
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Difficulty: Intermediate

You'll feel like a queen when you hit the fairway sporting these fancy, fun covers on your clubs! Using only one color per row, the slip stitch method used here produces a wonderful color effect that only *looks* difficult!

SIZE

One size fits most golf clubs.

MATERIALS

- Malabrigo Worsted Weight Yarn (216 yards per 3.5 oz);
1 skein each color: [G] 11 Apple Green, [P] 39 Molly
and [W] 602 Pale Khaki
- 1 set US 5 / 3.75 mm straight needles
- 1 set US 7 / 4.5 mm straight needles
- Scissors
- Darning needle
- Pompom maker

GAUGE

20 sts/ 24 rows = 4 inches in St st on larger needles

PATTERN NOTES

Tiny Diamonds Pattern:

Row 1: With P, purl.

Row 2: With G, k1, slip one st with yarn in back (sl 1 wyib), *k1, sl 3 wyib; rep from *, end k1, sl 1 wyib, k1.

Row 3: With G, k1, *p3, sl 1 with yarn in front (wyif); rep from *, end p3, k1.

Row 4: With P, k2, *sl 1 wyib, k3; rep from *, end sl 1 wyib, k2.

Row 5: With P, purl.

Row 6: With G, k1, *sl 3 wyib, k1; rep from *.

Row 7: With G, k1, p1, *sl 1 wyif, p3; rep from *, end sl 1 wyif, p1, k1.

Row 8: With P, k4, *sl 1 wyib, k3; rep from *, end k1.

Repeat these 8 rows for pattern.

PATTERN

Cast on 49 sts. Work in K2, P2 rib for 7 inches. Change to larger needles, working Pattern for 7 inches. With G, begin decrease rows as follows:



Row 1: K4, k2tog to last st, k1.
Row 2 (and all even rows): Purl.
Row 3: K3, k2tog to last st, k1.
Row 5: K2, k2tog to last st, k1.
Row 7: K1, k2tog to last st, k1.
Row 9: K2tog across.

FINISHING

Cut yarn, leaving 18 inch tail. Thread tail through remaining sts and pull tightly to close. Sew side seam. Make spirals as follows: Cast on 15 (25, 35) sts. Row 1: Knit into front, back and front of each stitch across. Row 2: Bind off. Attach spirals to top of cover.
